Supporting Kessler Scholars Over the Summer

- Navigating relationships with family and peers
 - Break-away guilt and returning home after the first year of college
- Financial responsibilities and family obligations
 - More than 25% of first-year Kessler Scholars reported being a provider of financial support for their family
- Structured (and funded!) summer enrichment opportunities to further student learning and engagement
 - #MakeYourMarkMonday campaign on Kessler Scholars and Alumni LinkedIn Group
 - Summer Research Opportunity Program (SROP) at U-M for Kessler Scholars




First-Year Kessler Scholar: HIP Interest

Over two-thirds of first-year Kessler Scholars report that they are interested in studying abroad

70% are interested in working with a professor on an undergraduate research project

Almost 90% are interested in having an internship experience




Making the Most of Summer

Promoting High-Impact Practices (HIPs):

- HIPs are associated with a range of positive outcomes:
 - Higher levels of engagement in deep learning, higher GPAs, improved writing skills, higher retention rates, and lower odds of underemployment ^{1,2}
- FGLI students are less likely to experience
 HIPs compared to their peers ³

Approaches to Summer Transition Support

Tailored summer bridge or pre-orientation programs specifically designed for Kessler Scholars

Short-term summer programs that support Kessler Scholars and other students (optional or required)

Multi-week pre-college summer academic programs that support Kessler Scholars and other students Other summer transition support for Kessler Scholars (e.g., virtual meetups, peer mentor/ambassador outreach)



Focus Group Findings from Ithaka S+R

Student Focus Group Feedback on Summer Programming

- Overall positive experience students found the summer support to be beneficial and useful
- Needs: Experience the campus environment, understand academic expectations, program support, and financial aid, and make new friends and connections
- **Challenges:** Balancing attendance with family responsibilities, summer jobs, other summer support programs, college sports

Promising practices

- Interactive programming, campus and city tours, and social content really foster belonging
- · Be mindful of the hidden costs of attendance limited dining operations, family travel/lodging
- Timing matters! Carefully consider dates in relation to fall start and other orientation activities
- Sensitize faculty, staff and campus units to the particular needs of scholars
- Virtual support through online events or peer mentoring can help to reach more students
- Provide support to students to navigate the financial aid process given FAFSA changes
